From Cold War to Cold Peace

This course provides essential background for understanding the diplomatic and military history of the late twentieth and early twenty-first centuries. We intend to make this a "lively lecture course." Through active portrayals of both the Soviet and American positions we will highlight the main issues in contention and encourage an appreciation of the constraints felt by both sides as they sought to reconcile their differences, while avoiding war.




